# Thy Rod and Thy Staff Psalm 23:4

Living in perilous times makes comfort hard to find.

However, as sheep we find comfort in the presence of the Shepherd.

## I. Our Shepherd Is Personal

As we move deeper into Psalm 23, we move closer to the Shepherd.

Notice in verse four, the psalmist says, "I will fear no evil: for thou art with me."

He is no longer speaking from a distance.

He is now in communion with the Shepherd.

We find that Job moved closer to the Lord through his suffering.

Compare Job 1:1 and Job 42:1-6.

Job was saying, "Lord, it is as though I had only heard of You before, but now I know You."

How many of us talk about the Lord but have no real communion with Him?

Often we brag, "He is my Savior. He meets all my needs!"

We are to commune with Him.	A shepherd would also use the rod to part the sheep's wool and search for a wound or disease on the flesh.

They realized the shepherd had all the power he needed.	It means that whatever we are facing in life, God is present. He is with us.
In <b>Exodus 14:10-17</b> , we see that the rod was a symbol of power and authority.	In John 8:58, the Lord Jesus said, "Before Abraham was, I AM"
